Syllabus	
Prerequisites/requirements	Proper knowledge of Classic Greek and Latin. Knowledge of Greek and Roman History; Early Christianity; Byzantium; Medieval History.
Expected learning outcomes (according to Dublin Descriptors) (it is recommended that they are congruent with the learning outcomes contained in A4a, A4b, A4c tables of the SUA-CdS)	<p><i>Knowledge and understanding</i> The student will be able to reach a proper use of the epigraphical data, targeted to archaeological / historical research.</p> <p><i>Applying knowledge and understanding</i> Capacity of learning and active use of the basic epigraphic tools.</p> <p><i>Making informed judgements and choices</i> The students will be able to establish dynamic relations between the epigraphical and archaeological data.</p> <p><i>Communicating knowledge and understanding</i> A written document, as an inscription, is intrinsically closed to an immediate understanding. The student, by active participation to the workshop, will obtain an intermediation ability in using inscriptions as historical and archaeological documents.</p> <p><i>Capacities to continue learning</i> To read, to translate, to understand and to analyze the inscriptions as published in the most common epigraphic editions, will be the occasion to learn 'on the field', to achieve a direct knowledge of these sources by a specific point of view very different from the usual approach in Humanities.</p>

Contents	The goal of the course is to offer a first view about main tools of study of the inscriptions.
