Learning Objectives	Lessons aim at introducing students to a reflection on the relationship between Christianity (in its origins and development) and Mediterranean cultures, with a focus on the inter-religious dynamics with paganism and the other two Abrahamic monotheisms (Judaism, Islam).
Course prerequisites	-Knowledge of the Italian languageFamiliarity with the methodological tools of historical researchAptitude for the analysis of both textual and monumental sources.

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Teaching strategies	Face-to-face lessons, seminar activities, class discussions, collective critical reflection on texts and audio-video materials. Students will be encouraged to present a paper, as well as to speak in public about a topic of specific interest. Attendance to round tables, lectures and supplementary seminars on topics related to the course, held by scholars from other Universities, will also be encouraged.

Assessment methods	The assessment method is an oral interview. In agreement with the students, an intermediate examination consisting of a written paper on a topic of specific interest, related to the course, may be added.

In order to achieve a high or excellent grade, students must demonstrate a complete and thorough knowledge of the subject, a high level of autonomy in analysis and critical judgement, and adequate capacity of argumentation and exposition.
