Learning Objectives	The course, not present in the three-year training course, allows the acquisition of the analytical and interpretative tools aimed at the thematic framework, both theoretically and practical, of the material testimonies of funerary contexts In the context of the methodological and historiographical debate concerning funerary archaeology, with particular attention to the late Antiquity and early medieval period.
Course prerequisites	Knowledge of the basic principles of archaeological stratigraphy and documentation methods and tools.

Teaching strategie	The analysis of the contexts is addressed by following thematic pathways, providing active and critical participation by the students. The theoretical transmission of concepts and methods is integrated with direct tutorials on documentation (written, graphic, photographic) and on the exhibits.
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	The frontal lectures are systematically supported by the projection of images and PowerPoint presentations that stimulate the active and critical participation of the students.

Applying knowledge and understanding on:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The course allows you to observe, analyse, describe and contextualize in the broader scope of reference sites, monuments and finds also through the analysis of graphic and photographic documentation. In the seminarial lessons and in laboratory exercises students are directly involved in self-test and evaluation opportunities in the course of any gaps.
Soft skills	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <i>Making informed judgments and choices</i> The course allows the acquisition of the capacity: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> to critically rework the contents, linking the knowledge in a multidisciplinary way, applying them also to different situations, both on the thematic and methodological level; to use correctly all sources -bibliographical and materials-, the methods and tools necessary for the filing, cataloging and study of contexts and finds and the field survey. <i>Communicating knowledge and understanding</i> The course allows: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> to acquire a good level of control of the code of the written and oral language through the direct involvement of the students in the presentation in the classroom -in seminarial form and through multimedia instruments- of thematic insights based on examples also related to neighboring territories that allow the direct recognition of the monument; direct contact with the contexts object of study, also through visits and inspections, that induces the student to participate actively in the disciplinary path and then to exercise the communicative tool; to experience 'group work' in an integrated, interdisciplinary and complementary way, with diversified and defined autonomy levels. The latter is an important aspect to be highlighted in relation to the professional figure of the archaeologist, which involves the organization of the work in research team and the acquisition of diversified competences. This exercise is also linked to the field activities promoted by the degree course. <i>Capacities to continue learning</i> In order for the student to become increasingly autonomous in the



	<p>research activity, the course aims:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">○ the constant self-test of acquired compétences;○ the integration between the various sectoral viewpoints in organically constituted synthetic frameworks;○ the learning capacity is also enhanced and monitored in the individual study envisaged, in the course of frontal didactics, of the seminarial activities, of the exercises and in laboratory;○ the acquired learning capacity allows to work in full autonomy integrating the formative and experiential path also in research contexts.

Content knowledge	<p>Funerary archaeology: methods, tools and contexts.</p> <p>1. Introductory picture. Problems related to the definition of the discipline; setting of studies in which the debate on funerary archaeology (theoretical archaeology, new archaeology, post-trial archaeology) is inserted. Methodological and interpretative approaches to funerary archaeology and themes subject to debate: systemic approaches; symbolic and social approaches. Limits and potentialities in the interpretation of the funerary data.</p> <p>2. The cemetery: Funerary contexts of late antiquity and early medieval age in regional and extra-regional (location and organization of funeral spaces; typology of the settlement; commissioning and mode of attendance; relationship between funeral area and cult building; relationship between funerary area and pre-existing structures).</p> <p>3. The grave: Type and structure of the grave; internal/external relationship in the funerary context; the body and its treatment; practices, gestures and funerary rites. Excavation procedures and strategies and documentation.</p> <p>4. The deposition: Archaeotatology; elements of physical anthropology and tafonomic anthropology (primary and secondary burials; in full space and in empty space; collective burials); 'use' and 'reuse' of the tomb. Phases of excavation and exposure of the skeleton; documentation, removal and recovery of human remains.</p>

Assessment methods	The final exam is an oral interview. The course may provide for an intermediate test (optional) aimed at the presentation in a seminarial form in the classroom of a study on a



	<p>funerary context chosen by the students, presented individually or in groups, with the possibility of overcoming a part of the exam.</p> <p>During the oral examination the student's knowledges and their abilities to apply theoretical and practical contents illustrated during the course will be assessed, also through the discussion of case studies.</p> <p>To pass the exam, the student must demonstrate to have enough knowledge and abilities in all the course topics. For the attribution of the final mark the ability to analyze and synthesize, the ability to carry out interdisciplinary connections, as well as the mastery of exposure will also be assessed.</p>

Final exam and grading criteria	<p>The final grade is awarded in thirtieths. The examination is deemed passed when the mark is greater than or equal to 18.</p> <p>The quantity and quality of the answers to the questions posed contribute to the definition of the vote; the student will have to demonstrate independence of judgment and adequate critical and expository argumentation skills (<i>supra</i> "Assessment methods"). The award of honours ('Lode') will consider all these elements together.</p> <p>In general, the assessment is structured as follows: 18-21: sufficient assessment. 22-24: fair assessment. 25-27: good assessment. 28-30: excellent evaluation.</p>

Particular attention will be paid to the archaeological investigation in the late antique cemetery complex of Canosa di Puglia (Christian catacombs).</p> <hr/> <p>Graduation Thesis</p> <p>The subjects subject to thesis are oriented to specific insights on sites, monuments, classes of materials, etc. pertinent to funerary archaeology.</p> <p>The job setting is aimed at acquiring and maturing the following capacities:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- to collect and manage critically a thematic bibliography also in a foreign language;- to rework, through the writing, the information, proposing a personal view of the subjects;- organize a thematic development in a coherent and methodologically correct way, from the analytical approach to the contextualization of synthesis, learning to circumscribe the subject of deepening also on the basis of historiographical parameters. <p>The exam calendar is published on the Corso di Laurea website.</p>
