Prerequisites/requirements	Topics, chronological and geographic scope of the course are different from those in the first cycle of study. Prerequisites are the skills learned before about the classical and pre-classical archeology.

They will learn a method of investigation: the reasoned reading of equal situations that can found within the ancient Italy.</u></p> <p><i>Applying knowledge and understanding</i> <u>Teaching aims to give broad and new knowledge about the entire Italian cultural field; the student will be able to inscribe these on knowledge about other of cultural, chronological and geographical field.</u></p> <p><i>Making informed judgements and choices</i> <u>The learned knowledge of the most important cultural expressions of Italic populations becomes the basis to understand the archaeological items that student will find in future studies or work experience.</u></p> <p><i>Communicating knowledge and understanding</i> <u>The subjects learned during the course will allow the student to use a specific language in the future. Students will be able to read an image and communicate through the images (for formative, scientific, dissemination</u></p>

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	<p>needs).</p> <p><i>Capacities to continue learning</i></p> <p><u>The student can use and apply the research method and the contents learned during the course for other geographical and chronological context or to more specific case studies.</u></p>
Contents	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <u>Lessons will be about the history and culture of the people who lived in ancient Italy from the beginning of the Iron Age (IX century BC) to the archaic period (VI century BC). Items will be about people living in north and central part of Italy (the Venetians, the Ligurians, the Etruscans, the Latins, the Umbrians, the Sabelli, the Piceni) and then about Iapigi, Enotri and Opici, cultures of southern Italy. Important aspects of civilization will be analyzed (type of settlements, territory's occupation, domestic constructions, ritual typology and funeral uses), artistic-crafts manifestations; and relationships with external, near or far populations, and influences.</u>
