They are also expected to be able to assess the quality and the main features of a critical edition and to carry out bibliographic research in this field.
	- Applying knowledge and comprehension Ability to recognise and appreciate the most important critical editions of classical texts; to produce and discuss a critical edition; to deal with analysing of ancient literary texts; to assess the transmission and reception of Greek and Latin works; to achieve innovative research (online information sources and bibliographic databases).
