Syllabus	
Learning Objectives	The course offers to the students an understanding and the theory and of the practical meaning of contemporary geopolitics and on the geopolitical hegemonies. The student will be able to 1) acquire knowledge of the main concepts, tools and authors; 2) understand the different methodologies used in geopolitical analysis (positivism, critical ex.); 3) Understand the interaction between geopolitical sciences and imperialism and colonialism; 4) understand new forms of geopolitical representations and hegemonies. He will be able to make the difference between the political uses of geopolitics for the construction of global hegemonies, critical geopolitics and the diffusion of geopolitical patterns in the public opinion.

Contents	The course will examine the history and the contemporary use of Geopolitics in order to critically examine the political geographies of European imperialism, cold war and post-cold war geopolitics, and the contemporary geopolitical landscapes. In particular, questions of borders, migrations and biopolitics will be discussed in relation to the 'making of the European Self' and its associated geographies. The postcolonial and the decolonial will also be presented by taking into consideration a geographical perspective. In the Second part of the course the students will take into consideration the contemporary forms of hegemony and the discussion of the relations in the EU countries, in particular concerning the geopolitical representations of the different areas. In the Third part of the course the student will take into consideration the relation between Europe/EU and the Euro-med region, as well as the relations between the Euro-Med region and other northern African countries, Turkey and Middle-East.
