Expected learning outcomes			
Knowledge and understanding on:		Comprehension of basic economic concepts, allowing to understand the functioning of markets, the behavior of economic agents, and the characteristics of the main macroeconomic variables.	
Applying knowledge and understanding on:		Students should be able to apply these skills to a wide range of areas of economic analysis. The attention to empirical applications would allow students to assimilate easier basic concepts, but also to read descriptive graphs and statistics. Tools provided during the course will allow students to develop their own critical capacity regarding the possibilities and limitations of the predominant economic approach, and to understand which contributions are best suited to the context.	
Soft skills		Students are invited to participate to the discussion during the course. Due to high number of attendees, seminar activities are planned: students divided into working groups will be able to discuss topical issues (i.e., economic and socio-occupational impacts of Covid).
