Syllabus	

Learning Objectives	 Adequate basic knowledge of medieval history, free of clichés and stereotypes. Ability to understand the historiographical debates that developed on the most significant issues of institutional, economic, social, cultural and religious history of medieval Europe of the Latin-Germanic tradition between the 5th and 15th centuries. Acquisition of the awareness of the open nature of human events and of how little objective historical reconstructions are. Acquisition of language skills: the student will have to acquire the specific vocabulary of the discipline. Ability to learn precise information on historical research: its traditions and its advanced methods for the study and interpretation of historical facts.
Course prerequisites	Adequate knowledge of the general lines of the history of medieval Europe of Latin-Germanic tradition between V and XV century.
Contents	The course includes a first part dedicated to the critical knowledge of some important issues of medieval history of an institutional, economic, religious and social nature, with particular reference to historiographical debates and to the different typology of historical sources. In the second part , in practical exercises, students will be started to use both paper and online research tools and will be guided in the elaboration of an essay, with related annotated bibliography, on a topic to be agreed upon.

Methods of assessment	The final exam will be an oral one (in italian), with questions aimed to verify the student's knowledge of the themes discussed during frontal lessons as well as those treated in the program's texts.

Evaluation criteria	The student must demonstrate: - knowledge of the learning contents in a critical and analytical way; - that he is able to elaborate personal judgments on historical phenomena, starting from the critical reading of the sources; - his ability to use the technical language of the discipline. In particular, students' awareness will be assessed: - how little historical reconstructions are objective; - that narrative sources are never one mere reflection of reality.
