<b>Content knowledge</b>	<p>Students will be introduced to the pragmatic and textual dimension of the communicative act in a multifunctional perspective.</p> <p>The following topics will be explored: pragmatics, deixis and context, from sentences to utterances, speech act theory, face and politeness theories, illocutionary force, literal and intended meaning. Persuasive strategies, the implicit meaning, brain correlates of implicit meaning</p>

<b>Assessment</b>	
<b>Assessment methods</b>	<p>Written exam is formed by open-ended answers with score; it involves a practical exercise focused on pragmatic-textual analysis of a short extract. Students will have to demonstrate they have acquired minimum contents of the discipline and be able to carry out a pragmatic analysis of different texts. Intermediate tests re not foreseen .</p> <p>The results of the written test will be published on the Esse3 platform</p>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>○ students must be able to recognize linguistic and pragmatic structures and be able to apply, even in a practical way, the theoretical notions learned, moving confidently within the broad disciplinary field</li><li>● <i>Autonomy of judgment</i><ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>○ ability to define the main linguistic features of oral and written texts and to argue hypotheses. Final exam and grading criteria	<p>The final vote is expressed in thirtieths. The exam is considered passed when the mark is greater than or equal to 18 according to the following pattern</p> <p>insufficient assessment</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- 18-21: sufficient assessment</li><li>- 22-24: fair assessment</li><li>- 25-27: good assessment</li><li>- 28-30 (with possible award of distinction): very good or excellent mark</li></ul> <p>The written test consists of open answers with a score. A higher score will be assigned to the pragmatic analysis exercise. Clarity of exposition, consistent argumentation, language properties, absence of spelling and grammatical errors contribute to the attribution of the final grade.</p>
