Learning Objectives	The course aims to train students so that they possess a specific knowledge of the cultural and historical-literary traditions of Christianity of the early centuries (I-IV) with particular emphasis on events and movements of the Mediterranean basin.
Course prerequisites	The student will have to know the main lines of development of historical processes from antiquity to late antiquity; and know how to independently question the sources on specific issues related to ancient history.

Syllabus	
Content knowledge	<p><i>From Christianities to Christianity among pagans and heretics along the Mediterranean coast.</i></p> <p><i>The first part of the course will describe the conditions that led to the emergence of the thought of early Christianity. The development of the main thought forms of early Christianity that spread in the Mediterranean basin, starting with the historical figure of Jesus, will then be described. The next part will focus on the varied doctrines of the different Christianities, their ideological structure, theories, diffusion and different reception in the Mediterranean basin through contemporary texts and testimonies, with particular attention to ideological relations with pagan philosophical and religious culture. Finally, it will deal with the relationship now of assimilation now of bitter conflict with pagan cultures and heretical forms.</i></p> <p><i>The course will include the analysis of texts in translation provided in class and available in the form of an online handout, which will be useful for an in-depth study of the course topics.</i></p>

Final exam and grading criteria	<p>For the purposes of the evaluation, the degree of knowledge of the main issues related to historical research and the types of sources proper to Christianity of the origins and Late Antiquity and their interpretation will be verified.</p> <p>Particular attention will be paid to the ownership of language and the level of historical-literary skills on sources. The assessment will follow the following docimological parameters:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - insufficient grade (<18): lack of basic knowledge and inability to provide a correct interpretation of texts; lack of knowledge of literary history. - sufficient grade (18-21): possession of basic literary knowledge; mainly correct treatment and interpretation of texts but conducted with imprecision and poor autonomy. - positive vote (22-24): possession of literary and historical knowledge of intermediate level; treatment and interpretation of texts correct, but not always precise and autonomous. - Good vote (25-27): possession of literary and historical knowledge of good level; treatment and interpretation of texts fully correct, sometimes not precise and autonomous. - excellent grade (28-30): possession of high-level literary and historical knowledge; correct treatment and interpretation of texts, conducted with autonomy and precision.
