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Learning Obje	Learning Objectives		The aim of the course is to provide specialized skills regarding the philological			
		method, applied to the texts of the Middle Ages and Humanism. They include				
		knowledge of the Italian and European culture of this period at high levels, in its				
		literary genres and languages, skills in the application of Lachmann's method (and				
		subsequent modifications) to the texts of the Italian tradition in Latin, ability to				
		implement a historical and critical analysis of a literary text, specialized language				
		skills.

Teaching strategie	The course consists mainly of classroom-taught lessons. Seminars will be held in which students are asked to work in groups on a part of a text or on literary documents relating to it, as a prelude to conducting partly autonomous research, with the teacher's guidance, which will then be discussed in class. Three CFU will be allocated to a laboratory in which, under the guidance of the teacher, students will experience the process of publishing a short humanistic text, retracing in practice all the stages of the philological method up to the 'emendatio' and translation.

Knowledge and understanding on:	In-depth knowledge of the cultural process peculiar to the age of Humanism and to the philological approaches to Italian literature of the 14th and 15th centuries.	
Applying knowledge and understanding on:	Ability to apply knowledge of contexts and methodologies to independent study of texts.

Ability to distinguish between bibliographical tools and the various methodological approaches to the study of a cultural (and literary) phenomenon, to use these appropriately and to make critical evaluation of the sources they use.</li> <li>Communicating knowledge and understanding. Syllabus		
Content knowledge	Through the reading of a complete work representative of the humanist literary tradition, the course seeks to familiarize students with the research processes leading to the publication and interpretation of the text, and to its reception with its contemporary and later audiences. The text is analysed, to find out the connections with the classical tradition and the cultural and historical context, disclosing the plurality of scientific approach.

Assessment criteria	<ul> <li>Knowledge and understanding. At the end of the course the student will be able to display adequate knowledge of the cultural process peculiar to the Humanist period and of the philological methodologies applied to literary documents written in the 14th and 15th centuries.</li> <li>Applying knowledge and understanding. At the end of the course the student must be able to elaborate an analysis of literary documents, to expose their contents and contexts, as well as the history of tradition.</li> <li>Autonomy of judgment. At the end of the course the student must be able to make autonomous use of the critical bibliography provided and to decide which tools are most useful for the analysis of the cultural phenomenon in question and to use these appropriately.</li> <li>Communicating knowledge and understanding. At the end of the course the student must be able to form an autonomous opinion regarding what she/he has read and analysed, using appropriate language and terminology.</li> <li>Capacities to continue learning. At the end of the course the student must be able to carry out a study of unpublished or little-known medieval and humanist texts.</li> </ul>	
Final exam and grading criteria	The final grade is awarded in thirtieths (30/30). The exam is considered passed when the mark is greater than, or equal to 18.  The test is not passed, if the student has failed to study a part of the program. To obtain a high grade, the student must demonstrate, that he has also acquired autonomy of judgment and communication skills. Praise is awarded if the capacities to continue learning is added to these skills.
