The goal is to acquire advanced skills through rigorous analysis of written sources from the point of view of literary history, lexical and deepening the philological aspect, through the study of transmission of Latin medieval texts.
	Applying knowledge and understanding The student will have to demonstrate critical skill in reading, understanding and interpreting medieval Latin texts and related historical-literary issues; ability to identify thematic links between divers types of literary genres in their historical context; ability to

	critically apply the acquired knowledge through appropriate research methods.
