Learning Objectives	The course aims at providing the students with a critical awareness of the role played by the Judeo-Christian tradition in shaping the European cultures. The impact of this tradition will be assessed through the analysis and historical consideration of textual, iconographic and monumental sources.

Expected learning outcomes	Knowledge and understanding Students will develop a clear knowledge of different aspects of the cultural, historical and religious influence of the Christian tradition on the social and geographical space of Europe. They will be able to understand both complex texts and visual documents related to Christian tradition(s), placing them into a historical and critical perspective. Applying knowledge and understanding By means of an interdisciplinary reflection, students will apply their understanding of historical and cultural phenomena of the Christian tradition to contemporary society. Making informed judgements and choices Students will learn to critically recognize and correctly evaluate the assessments of the Christian religious system based on commonplace ideas. Communicating knowledge and understanding Students will learn to communicate (also to a wider audience) the mutual influences between the Judeo-Christian tradition, its historical expressions and the plural European identity.
