Syllabus			
Course contents	<p>The territorial, political and institutional organization of Ancient Rome in its development from monarchical age to 476 AD.</p> <p>A special focus will be given to the late Republican age. Using ancient texts (mainly Cicero and Varro, but also Appian, Plutarch and Dio Cassius), we will study the political, institutional, cultural dynamics and mentality changes during the period from Gracchi to Augustus. The individual and collective reactions to the "crisis" will be discussed. During the course we will discuss political concepts, comparing ancient and modern ones.</p>
