Learning Objectives	Through an in-depth knowledge of a specific topic of Spanish Literature, also in relation to the European context, students will be led along a research path, making them compare on the one hand with the texts, on the other hand with a specialized critical bibliography, routing them to the research work.
Prerequisites	Advanced knowledge of the history and features of Italian literature and of the main features of at least one European literature. Knowledge of methodologies of literary analysis, meter and figures of speech. Knowledge of European history. Knowledge of the Spanish language is not required, but attendance of the Spanish language course is strongly recommended to those who did not study Spanish in high school or at university.
Expected learning outcomes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>Knowledge and understanding:</i> On completion of this module, students must have acquired: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - thorough knowledge of the work of one or more authors (also in relation to the history of the texts' tradition and their variants) and of the literary genres of a given era; - command of philological and analytical methodologies of a literary text; - ability to place texts in their historical and cultural context, in Spain and in Europe, having also studied their critical bibliography. • <i>Applying knowledge and understanding:</i> On completion of this module, students must possess: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - high comprehension skills of literary languages thanks to the application of analytical methodologies and critical exercise applied to the texts studied; - ability to contextualize literary phenomena, also

	<p>through the comparison between research hypotheses and different methodologies to apply to the texts taken into account.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - ability to connect the literary texts studied with other texts and other artistic codes (art, cinema, music...) • <i>Making informed judgements and choices:</i> the methodological consideration accompanying the reading of the literary texts and critical bibliographies contributes to the development of critical awareness, which is a precondition for making independent, informed judgements. In particular, students will learn to analyze the discourses and ideological assumptions lying behind literary texts. • <i>Communicating knowledge and understanding:</i> the study of literary texts allows students to attain an elaborate specialised vocabulary; the acquisition of analytical tools helps express complex concepts. The Master's Degree graduate's essential abilities will be a mature level of expression and clear and effective argumentation. • <i>Learning ability:</i> the abilities acquired will give students the chance to develop their learning ability, also strengthened by confrontations with the teacher and colleagues. Working at the laboratory also gives the chance to test one's analytical skills, even applied to research subjects that were not explained at class.
<p>Evaluation criteria</p>	<p>It will be evaluated:</p> <p><i>Knowledge and understanding</i></p> <p>The knowledge of the bibliography and the level of in-depth analysis of the texts will be examined; the student's ability to adopt an appropriate vocabulary and adequate textual analysis tools in the presentation of the literary texts under study.</p> <p><i>Applied knowledge and understanding skills</i></p> <p>The student will have to demonstrate that he or she knows how to link the literary texts studied not only to each other, but also to the historical and cultural context. The ability to apply the acquired knowledge to other historical-literary fields will also be taken into account.</p> <p><i>Autonomy of judgement</i></p> <p>The ductility in the use of the methods and concepts studied in the course and the ability to deal with a bibliography that is no longer essential, but specialized, will be taken into account, thus demonstrating that one has refined one's critical capacity.</p>

	<p><i>Communication skills</i></p> <p>The student's ability to argue on complex issues will be assessed, taking into account the most significant critical contributions.</p> <p><i>Ability to learn</i></p> <p>The ability to understand and link the literary texts studied to precise historiographical contexts will be taken into account, both in Spanish literature and, more generally, in European literature. It will also take into account the ability to export the methodological tools acquired to other fields and to identify possible research paths also for the selection of the thesis.</p>

Course contents	<p><i>Memory and invention: the poetic work of Luis de Góngora.</i> Analysis of texts by the Cordovese poet (an anthology of sonnets, romances and letrillas; the <i>Polyphemus</i> and the <i>Soledad primera</i>) aimed at illustrating the evolution of his poetics, the links with the Greek-Latin, Italian and Spanish traditions, the invention of a poetic language renewed with respect to the Petrarchist roots. The course also includes reflections dedicated to the seventeenth-century literary controversy around Góngora and its twentieth-century fortune.</p>

Teaching methods	The course provides, in addition to frontal teaching, also a seminar-type work in which students will actively participate in the analysis of texts: the aim of a master's degree course is to develop research aptitudes in the student, inviting him/her to experiment with critical		

	<p>methodologies acquired even on texts or topics not taken into consideration by the teacher. In this sense, in the didactic articulation, the seminar aspect will be privileged.</p> <p>The support of multimedia tools will be provided.</p>
<p>Assessment methods</p>	<p>Oral examination: interview conceived as a discussion, starting from the analysis of the scheduled texts. The student's contribution in the seminar will be evaluated as an integral part of the final examination.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - The examination timetable is published on the site of the Degree Course and on Esse3. - To register for the examination, usage of the Esse3 system is mandatory. The examination timetable can be consulted on the degree course website and on Esse3. Students must register for the exam using the Esse3 system.
<p>Thesis</p>	<p>To apply for a thesis in Spanish Literature you need to know the language.</p> <p>Students intending to write their thesis in Spanish Literature are required to contact the teacher, by email if preferred, at least one year before the beginning of the relevant graduation session.
