Content knowledge	<i>The critical analysis of the present in relation to its historicity as well as the necessary overcoming of social anomie. The finality of the course is the identification of the fundamental characteristics of modern democracy as it has been defined from Machiavelli to the present day. Through the reading of philosophical, historical and literary texts, the forms of consciousness that have marked the history of modern Europe will be identified.</i>
