Syllabus	
Content knowledge	The course is a general introduction to the main problems of ancient Greek history and related sources, organised as follows: methods of research in ancient history and approach to the different categories of sources; presentation of the historical phases into which Greek history is conventionally divided and the main events and processes from the Bronze Age to the Roman conquest; commented reading of written sources, including some inscriptions of relevant historical interest.
