Syllabus	<ul> <li>An anthropological-philosophical survey of the human condition of belief offers the possibility of anchoring the ethical-moral discussion in a closer relationship between historical-theoretical knowledge and impact assessment. Such a contribution enables the study of philosophical anthropology to broaden the autonomy of judgement and encourage the assumption of a doxastic responsibility by students in the present and future Communicating knowledge and understanding</li> <li>Knowledge of the issues raised in the complex relationship between human beings and an Ethics of belief enables the student to acquire hermeneutic and communicative skills that he or she can use to guide relational life with regard to self, others and the ecosystem in which we live Capacities to continue learning</li> <li>Learning about the world in which we are immersed, understanding it through anthropological categories is to favour a balance between theories and life practices (understood as actions guided by a healthy and responsible use of reason) and respect for one's own and others' freedoms</li> </ul>
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Content knowledge	Title: 'The Ethics of Belief. Believing with or without reason'  The course entails a study of the texts and authors that have dealt with an Ethics of belief, i.e. the criteria (of an epistemic or prudential nature) that should always accompany the subject's adherence to, maintenance or abandonment of a belief
Texts and readings	Texts by René Descartes, John Locke, David Hume, Blaise Pascal, William Clifford, William James, Edmund Gettier and Alvin Plantinga.  Teaching materials will be available on the course Teams class
