 Knowledge and understanding on: the student must know and understand the meaning of the fundamental rules and principles of Canon law, Jewish law and Islamic law, with further comparative studies with Hinduism and Buddhism.
 Applying knowledge and understanding on: the student will have to make a capacity for judgment in the analysis of religiously characterized phenomena;
 Making informed judgments and choices: the student must have the necessary skills in order to orient himself with a critical and autonomous approach to confessional rights;

	 Communicating knowledge and understanding The student will have to make an adequate expository ability with regard to the norms and respective confessional rights by demonstrating that he is able to recognize the normative data deriving from them; Capacities to continue learning The student will have to acquire an ability to understand and learn the peculiarities of the confessional systems and the rules deriving from them, with particular regard to the canonical system and the religions of the Mediterranean Sea.
Contents	The canonical order and the confessional systems of the Mediterranean religions cannot escape the rule of juridical living that we also see applied in state systems and which characterizes the life of man in relation to other men. The course aims to present the essential features of the law of the Church and other Mediterranean religions, with regard to the membership requirements and the role exercised by religious belief in the various facets of daily life and the rights that follow from it (marriage, interactions between food and religion, clothing and religion, environment and religion, etc.).
Course program	Canon law: Divine right and human right. The codification of canon law. The status of the faithful, the laity and clerics. Mixed marriages. Dietary rules in canon law. Jewish law: sources and organization. Interreligious marriages in Jewish law. Kosher nutrition, ritual slaughter, food prescriptions. Islamic law: sources and organization. I Interfaith marriages in Islamic law. Food rules in Islamic law. Hindu law: comparison with the religions of the Mediterranean. Buddhist law: comparison with the religions of the Mediterranean.

Teaching methods	The lectures will last 48 hours (6 CFU) which will take place in the classroom also with the use of slides. Attending students will be distributed doctrinal and jurisprudential material on specific topics dealt with in class also through possible seminars and multimedia tools.
Assessment methods	Verification of learning will take place through the oral exam. Attending students (who have attended at least half of the course) will be offered an optional intermediate written test on one of the topics covered in class.

Evaluation criteria

 - The evaluation criteria adopted are aimed at verifying the knowledge of the program and the ability to understand the similarities and differences between the sorts and norms of a confessional nature in the context of canon law and Mediterranean Sea religions;
