	Starting with an essential presentation of the historical-political framework of	
	the German-speaking countries, the main literary currents and phenomena of	
	the period in question will be examined in depth. The literary-historical	
	discourse will focus in particular on fiction, especially the short genre (novella and short story). The frontal presentation of literary-historical notions will be	
	supplemented by the reading and analysis of selected literary texts (see below),	
	which also involves active (inter)participation on the part of the students.

Assessment criteria	<ul> <li>Knowledge and understanding</li> <li>The examination will take into account the degree of ability the student has achieved in the knowledge of the main lines of development in the literary history of German-speaking countries in the period of reference.</li> <li>Applying knowledge and understanding</li> <li>The examination test will also take into account the student's possession of some essential hermeneutic skills in the autonomous reading of certain canonical texts, the development of a transparent notion of the major spacetime relationships within the subject</li> <li>Autonomy of judgment</li> <li>The test will also take into account the autonomous ability to use the methodological tools at the basis of the discipline and to organise the main information data with transparency.</li> <li>Communicating knowledge and understanding</li> <li>It is hoped that at the end of the course the student will have perfected a vocabulary specific to the various areas of literary-cultural in-depth study and possess solid skills to relate and orally argue the results of their analysis on specific themes and issues in the literature of German-speaking countries.</li> <li>Communication skills</li> <li>It is hoped that at the end of the course the student will have perfected a vocabulary specific to the various areas of literary-cultural in-depth study and possess solid skills to relate and orally argue the results of their analysis on specific themes and issues in the literature of German-speaking countries.</li> <li>Capacities to continue learning</li> <li>The learning outcome will be assessed taking into account the ability to apply methodologies and critical tools to other in-depth study contexts.</li> </ul>
