Content knowledge	A Taste of Honey Gender, Ethnicity and Youth in postwar Britain Since the 1950s Britain has experienced a period of accelerated social and cultural change. This has coincided with the immigration of people of different cultures which has produced a multi-ethnic Britain, with a plurality of identities and heritages. One of the most powerful forces for change during this period has been the emergence of youth as an identifiable group with a very different lifestyle to members of an older generation, and with the capacity of affecting the very way of conceiving gender. The course focuses on the cultural impact of youth culture in postwar Britain and in particular on artistic languages such as literature, music and cinema.
