Learning objectives	This module focuses on some specific aspects of British literary and non-literary
	culture, and related contexts. Special attention is devoted to pressing
	contemporary issues within the cultures of the UK and the English-speaking
	countries. A selection of representative texts is considered for reading and
	analysis from a variety of potential perspectives that take account of their
	historicity no less than their contemporary resonances.

Course prerequisites	It is highly desirable that students attending possess adequate language competence, as the course is predominantly taught in English.
Teaching strategy	The course will be mainly taught in English; Italian will be resorted to occasionally, and when necessary.  Multimedia material will be used; all ppt presentations will be uploaded on the Teams platform.

Syllabus Content knowledge	Transatlantic Routes in British Culture and Literature, 1780s-2020s
Content knowicuge	This course is intended to explore a defining feature and crucial concern in contemporary British society and culture, i.e., the legacy of transatlantic slavery and Empire. A multi-focused perspective is offered, with a selection of late eighteenth- to twenty-first century primary sources. These include canonical literary texts and authors, such as Richard Steele and Jane Austen, but also 'new' voices in British literature and culture, such as Olaudah Equiano. The central relationship of past and present is investigated in the final part of the course, which considers some of the most significant voices that have engaged in this process of understanding and reconnecting, and includes writers Caryl Phillips and Andrea Levy.

Final exam and grading criteria	Assessment will consider and evaluate the above-mentioned activities and skills in relation to the expected learning outcomes. The grading criteria include evaluation of the language performance and communication skills.
