Syllabus	
Prerequisites/Requirements	The course is predominantly taught in Italian, some sources and texts analyzed are in the original language. It is highly desirable that students possess adequate historical and cultural competence acquired in Secondary Schools.

Contents	<p>The course of Russian culture mostly focuses on some specific aspects of Russian history and literary and nonliterary culture, and related contexts. Special attention is devoted to XIX century culture and literature in Russia. A selection of representative texts is considered for reading and analysis from a variety of potential perspectives that take account of their historicity no less than their contemporary resonances. Particular attention will be paid to specific aspects of literary culture and social history, with the contribution of methodologies and approaches, including Semiotics.</p>
Course program	<p>Anton Chekhov: life and works.</p> <p>The course focuses on the genesis and diffusion of the novel genre in Russia. Starting from an introduction to the Russian history from Middle Age to XXth century, the course aims to offer the students the instruments to identify and contextualize the development of Chekhov's works and poetics.</p>
