Course program					

The aim of the course is to develop proficient user language competence (C1 level, as described by the CEFR) and enable you to analyse the structure of words, their lexical and sense relations, word classes as well as the construction of phrases, clauses and sentences. You will also become aware of the relevance of these key notions for contrastive analysis and translation practice. The course is divided into 12 teaching units, each requiring five hours of seminar time. Each unit is composed of a) an introduction; b) an explanation of the linguistic concepts; c) illustrative examples from a wide range of authentic texts; d) language activities; e) a discussion of the translation problems that may arise when there are systemic differences across English and Italian; f) translation tasks into and out of English; g) a summary of the main points to remember; h) suggestions for further reading; i) additional language and translation tasks for consolidation and practice.

Teaching methods:

In keeping with recent trends in language and translation pedagogy, the course adopts the approach, design and procedures of Task-Based Language Teaching (TBLT). Learning is therefore student-centred, self-engaging and interactive. You will bring the coursebook *Linking Wor(I)ds* to every lesson together with an English dictionary for advanced learners and/or a bilingual English-Italian dictionary. Alternatively, you can use online dictionaries if you have a smartphone.

Auxiliary teaching: n/a

Assessment methods: In order to pass this 12-credit course, you need to achieve a minimum grade of 18/30 in the written and oral components of the exam, as detailed below.

Written exam: a 4-hour test made up of three interrelated sections: a) an essay of about 400 words on current world affairs (15 marks); b) a translation from English into Italian (7 marks); and c) a translation Italian into English (8 marks).

Oral exam: a 10-minute test during which you will: a) discuss one of the main procedures adopted when translating from English to Italian a text selected at random from the "Translation tasks" section contained in each of the 12 chapters of the coursebook *Linking Wor(I)ds*; b) show knowledge of key linguistic concepts and terminology; c) carry out one task selected at random from the activities contained in each of the 12 chapters of the Digital Workbook *English Lexis, Grammar and Translation*. You will bring your coursebook to the exam session and, if you wish, also your laptop or any other mobile device that will enable you to view your Digital Workbook.
