Syllabus	
Learning Objectives	Development and improvement of student's abilities in reading, writing, speaking and listening to English.
Course prerequisites	Good basic linguistic and cultural knowledge consistent with secondary school syllabuses. Mastery of written and spoken Italian.
Contents	Students are divided into three groups according to level (pre-intermediate; intermediate; upper intermediate) as defined by a preliminary English Language assessment test. The courses consist of activities designed to improve the student's reading, writing, listening and speaking skills through the study of grammar, vocabulary and phonology, analysis of spoken and written discourse (dialogues, films, television programmes, texts, etc), the production of written and oral communications of various types and the development of self-study skills.

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Methods of assessment	Written and/or oral testing during and at the end of the course.
Evaluation criteria	<p>In order to evaluate the student's progress, account will be taken (in accordance with the level of the course; as explained above, the three levels of achievement are <i>pre-intermediate; intermediate; upper intermediate</i>) of the extent to which he/she has acquired and/or consolidated his/her knowledge and understanding of English grammar, phonology and vocabulary. Criteria for assessment and attribution of the final mark	Attendance record, submission and quality of course assignments, performance in final written and/or oral exams.
<b>Additional information</b>	<p>The English Language Workshops are taught by native speaker language teachers. Students are divided into three levels (pre-intermediate; intermediate; upper intermediate) in accordance with their knowledge of the language. In the second half of September, before the courses begin, students are required to register. Information on how to register will be published at least two weeks before the courses begin.</p> <p>Students attending courses will be required to pass an end-of-course test for which they must register on Esse3; information regarding the date of the test will be provided by the language teachers towards the end of the course.</p> <p>Students in possession of a “non-attending student certificate” will be eligible to sit the exam for non-attending students on dates which will be communicated to the administrative office and indicated on the Esse3 platform.</p> <p>The exam timetable for non-attending students can be consulted on the relevant degree course website and on Esse3.</p> <p>Students must register for the exam using the Esse3 system.</p>
