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Learning Objectives	<ul> <li>Adequate basic knowledge of medieval history, free of clichés and stereotypes.</li> <li>Ability to understand the history of the European Middle Ages, through the treatment of the most significant themes of institutional, economic, social, cultural and religious history of medieval Europe of Latin-Germanic tradition between the 5th and 15th centuries.</li> <li>Acquisition of the awareness of the open nature of human events and of how little objective historical reconstructions are.</li> <li>Acquisition of language skills: the student will have to acquire the specific vocabulary of the discipline.</li> <li>Ability to learn precise information on historical research: its traditions; its rigorous and advanced methods for the study and interpretation of historical facts.</li> </ul>
Course prerequisites	- Knowledge of the general lines of medieval history.
Contents	The course consists into two modules: a) Institutional part (42 hours) The first module will trace the problematic knots of the history of the medieval age, with particular attention to the events of the Italian Middle Ages in the context of the Western Middle Ages. b) methodological and monographic part (21 hours) The second module will examine the methodological aspects of the discipline and will address, as a case study, the monographic theme on "Forms of communication in the Norman Southern Italy".
