| Syllabus           |  |
| Content knowledge  | The course aims to investigate the spread of Christianity in the different regions of Europe, with particular reference to the transition between Late Antiquity and the Middle Ages. In the first teaching module, general notions and contents will be provided in order to understand actors/people, problems, phenomena and political-religious dynamics peculiar to the historical period. In the second teaching module, specific attention will be paid to the figure of Gregory the Great and to his pontificate. Both modules will analyse some aspects related to the impact of Christianity on society: ecclesiastical institution and Christianization of peripheral areas; dynamics of inclusion/exclusion of non-Christians (pagans, heretics, barbarians); Christianity and social liminality/marginality; cult of the saints and devotional practices in the Mediterranean area. |
