Final exam and grading criteria Further information	The assessment criteria for each of the learning outcomes as listed above will take into account the level of maturity of the skills the candidate will be able to acquire from both classroom learning and self-study, and his or her ability to express them during attendance and in the examination. The final mark is awarded in thirtieths. The examination is deemed to have been passed when the mark is greater than or equal to 18, according to the following pattern - insufficient assessment - 18-21: sufficient assessment - 22-24: fair assessment - 25-27: good assessment - 28-30 (with possible award of distinction): very good or excellent mark.
