Syllabus		
Learning Objectives	The course is aimed at enhancing a supranational critical interpretation of	
	literary works by adapting the hermeneutical tools of literature and	
	philology for a wide cultural approach.	
Course prerequisites	The students should know about periodisation and the principal issues	
	regarding the history of European literature. The students should be able to	
	manage a methodology in literary criticism. The students should be able to	
	read and understand at least a UE language.	
Contents	The Europe that doesn't exist: counterfactual narrations and possible worlds.	
	The course examines some uchronic and counterfactual novels (utopias or	
	dystopias) in order to define some specific characteristics of their literary	
	genre and how they work out a critical analysis of the real world. The	
	divergence from reality, as concerning important historical events that	
	marked epochal turning points, will be also considered by the trauma studies perspective.	
	In addition to rethinking topical moments of Europe's political history the	
	indicated novels turn out to be an efficient instrument for deconstructing	
	the stereotypical cultural heritage of the old continent: the deviation that	
	leads to alternate history questions the centuries-old paradigm of imitation	
	along with the word pair reality/fiction on which it rests by redrawing the	
	boundaries between the disciplines like in the fluid relation between history	
	and narration as suggested by Hayden White. Considering its peculiar	
	critical perspective, uchronic literature addresses real political and cultural	
	problematics and in so doing claims its own plausibility: the fictive Europe	

	becomes a warning for the world to come. The fictive Europe can be a warning for the Europe to come.

Furthermore, the students' ability to apply methodological instruments and acquired knowledge to phenomena and contexts beyond the course's contents will be considered.
