Prerequisites/requirements	No mandatory requirements. It is however advisable to have taken the BA courses in History of Ancient Philosophy and History of Medieval
Expected learning outcomes (according to Dublin Descriptors) (it is recommended that they are congruent with the learning outcomes contained in A4a, A4b, A4c tables of the SUA-CdS)	 Knowledge and understanding: the course aims to provide students (i) with the ability to orientate themselves easily in the history of Greek, Arabic and Jewish thought by carefully distinguishing the elements of continuity rooted in the textual transmission from the elements of discontinuity at the interpretative level; (ii) the ability to relate texts belonging to the different cultures of the Middle Ages (Arabic-Islamic and Jewish); (iii) the ability to develop independent research skills both in reading the sources and in the use of secondary literature. Making informed judgements and choices / Applying knowledge and understanding: the course aims to refine the students' argumentative, critical and synthetic skills and their tools of historical criticism (especially those concerning the Arabic and Jewish philosophical traditions), and to provide them with the ability to undertake further specialization courses in the field of research.

	 Communicating knowledge and understanding: the course aims to provide the students with substantially improved skills in written and verbal communication and with the ability to pursue a project in depth. Ability to continue learning: the course aims to provide students with methods and tools to analyse critically different sources of the Arabic and Jewish Middle Ages and to update continuously their knowledge in history of philosophy.
Contents	"Legitimising philosophy through the art of concealment. The Guide of the perplexed Maimonides between orthodoxy and dissimulation".
	Starting from Leo Strauss' idea of a 'writing of reticence', the course intends to investigate the methods used by Maimonides in his 'Guide for the perplexed' to keep philosophy out of the masses: in the controversial questions of the creation of the universe, prophecy and providence, the philosophical solution is offered, for the few prepared, only in watermark.
