<i>Frontal lessons with the support of slides; seminars; exercises on practical cases. The course will take place through lectures and seminars (aimed at examining case law and materials emerging</i>

<b>Expected learning outcomes</b>	
<b>Knowledge and understanding on:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ The course intends to provide the essential tools for knowing the content of the International System intended as a system aimed at regulating legal relations between States and other entities with International Subjectivity. Students will be directed to the use of sources of knowledge and their autonomous evaluation, in order to make them able to autonomously interpret the different types of International and European Union Legislations.</li> </ul>
<b>Applying knowledge and understanding on:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Students will become familiar with the system of International and European Law Sources by learning to find and use the relevant normative texts and jurisprudence. They will also assess the impact of International and European Legislation and Jurisprudence on the Rules of Domestic Law. In particular, they will understand the specificities of the System of Rules of International Law and of the European Union, identifying their content and the mechanisms through which the latter end up translating into mandatory rules in the state system.</li> </ul>
<b>Soft skills</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● <i>Making informed judgments and choices</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ The ability to critically apply the acquired knowledge is required, framing the conduct of the subjects in the light of International Law. Students should be able to understand and use International Jurisprudence.</li> </ul> </li> <li>● <i>Communicating knowledge and understanding</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ The acquisition of legally correct terms and their use in the relevant International and European context is required.</li> </ul> </li> <li>● <i>Capacities to continue learning</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Students will have to develop a critical and autonomous thinking with respect to the issues addressed; they will also have to acquire adequate training knowledge with regard to issues that by nature involve more than one state system, essential knowledge in the performance of professions in the era of globalization.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ The degree of in-depth study of the topics on the program will be assessed, with particular attention to International and European Union Law Sources.</li> <li>● <i>Applying knowledge and understanding</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ The student must demonstrate that they have acquired the skills to assess the impact of International and European Legislation and Jurisprudence on the Rules of Domestic Law.</li> </ul> </li> <li>● <i>Autonomy of judgment</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ At the end of the course, the student is required to have developed the ability to critically apply supranational legislation and jurisprudence.</li> </ul> </li> <li>● <i>Communication skills</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ It is necessary for the student to develop good exposure skills with specialized technical language in order to verify the achievement of the learning outcomes indicated in the previous items.</li> </ul> </li> <li>● <i>Capacities to continue learning</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ The assessment concerns learning according to the way in which international training can be used in the world of work in the various fields in which the Degree Program is addressed. Speaking on issues that by nature involve more than one State System, it is essential knowledge in the performance of professions in the era of globalization.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
<p>Criteria for assessment and attribution of the final mark</p>	<p><i>The acquired knowledge is verified in the final exam and also through the use of intermediate tests.</i></p> <p><i>The oral exam will focus on in-depth, accurate and reasoned knowledge of a topic on the sources of International Law (up to 10 points), on the relationship between legal system and general issues (up to 10 points) and on European Union Law (up to 10 points).</i></p> <p><i>The written exam consists of multiple choice questions.</i></p> <p><i>The final evaluation will be expressed with a mark out of /30.</i></p> <p><i>In addition to the knowledge of the contents of the teaching program, the quality of the presentation, the use of appropriate technical language, the ability to analyse and reason will be used as an evaluation parameter.</i></p>
