<b>Learning Objectives</b>	<p><i>The course aims to analyze food crises in the globalized economy: from the crisis of the European agricultural policy protectionist, to the management of production surpluses, the lack of fairness in the distribution of food between the richest and the developing countries.</i></p> <p><i>The resurgence of food insecurity calls for renewed reflection on the protection of social rights, from the right to food to the right to produce food, in the international context.</i></p> <p><i>Through the analysis of the evolution of European legislation in the field of agriculture and through the study of international, European and national sources relating to the protection of the right to food, students will gain a thorough knowledge of the sources, also in English.</i></p>
