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Syllabus Learning Objectives	The course aims to develop theoretical and methodological skills for the critical understanding of the composition of cultural heterogeneities and national identities in contemporary societies. At the end of the course, students will have acquired the ability to decode and critically analyze the strategies for promoting intercultural interactions, examine national policies for promoting intercultural dialogue, prefigure evolutionary paths of intercultural dynamics with a critical spirit and independent judgment.
Course prerequisites	Constitutional Law
Contents	This course aims to enable students to identify, in the light of Comparative Public law's conceptual categories, the main legal issues related to transnational migrations and the condition of migrants in contemporary constitutional States, with particular reference to the protection of their fundamental rights at national and supranational level. In the first part, some fundamental concepts useful to the knowledge of comparative public law will be addressed: - method of comparative law; - civil law and common law systems; - sources of law in Western legal systems (in particular, in the European Union); - Constitution and constitutionalism; - forms of State and government; -fundamental rights and freedoms; - Comparative Constitutional Justice. Finally, the course will address some of the major legal issues raised by transnational migration, with particular reference to the European context. The comparative perspective adopted during the course will identify the main trends and models in managing migration, protecting the fundamental rights of migrant foreigners and building intercultural policies and strategies.
