Expected learning outcomes	The student must recognize the emergence of cultural conflicts and learn to manage their tension, both through a purely anthropological analysis approach and through the use of regulatory tools and the deepening of jurisprudential guidelines and individual "case studies".

At the same time, the course aims to raise some critical issues that sometimes a blind universalism of rights ignores, highlighting the "fact" of pluralism through an in-depth study of the topic of culturally motivated crimes and the responses of jurisprudence
