Syllabus	
Learning Objectives	The course provides the necessary knowledge and historical-cultural skills to critically understand the peculiar needs of the Ionian territory, characterized by a specific Euro-Mediterranean vocation and always open to multiculturalism.
Course prerequisites	Basic Knowledge of European History
Contents	One of the principle objectives of this Course is an examination of the identity and structural characteristics of the geo-historical space of the Medieval and Modern Mediterranean. In the second part of the Course the historiographical theme of the Medieval migrations and the policies of integration of the foreigner in the Euro-Mediterranean area will be developed. The extended program of the Course foresees the study of the following topics: Elements of general history of Europe and the Mediterranean in the Middle Ages - Elements of historical methodology - The original characteristics of European identity. The fall of the Western Roman Empire – The <i>Völkerwanderungen</i> , or the "migration of peoples", and the process of ethnogenesis of the European peoples - The Barbarians, the Roman Empire and the Genesis of Europe - The Late Roman Empire and the spread of Christianity. The Christianization of the Barbarians - The organization of the Church and the definition of Christian doctrine - Byzantium and the Mediterranean. The Byzantine intervention in the Mediterranean West - Justinian and the resumption of the imperial initiative - Italy, the epicenter of the Mediterranean: the Lombard invasion and its first developments. Papacy and Empire - The Arab world and the Mediterranean: Muhammad and the birth of Islam. The Muslim community of origins and the various phases of the expansion of Islam - Carolingian Europe and Charlemagne between myth and reality - Forms of integration in the Carolingian world: the Carolingians and the administration of the Empire - Medieval migrations: typologies, models and policies of integration of the foreigner in the Euro-Mediterranean area - Forms of hospitality and historical-anthropological aspects of mobility in the medieval Mediterranean.

The course will be delivered through lectures and seminars on specific issues relating to the typologies, models and policies of integration of foreigners in the Euro-Mediterranean space, forms of hospitality and the historical-anthropological aspects of mobility in the medieval Mediterranean. The lectures will allow the acquisition of knowledge relating to the general history of the Mediterranean in the Middle Ages; thematic seminars will also be held through the use of documentary material in order to develop a critical-exegetical reading of historical sources relating to the history of the Mediterranean. The course is not delivered in e-learning mode, unless otherwise provided by the University.
