Learning Objectives	The course aims at providing an overview of the law of aliens in international and European law, with its unavoidable consequences for domestic law. At the same time, it also aims at providing fundamental knowledge and study methods to understand its possible developments.

Rules on illegal immigration. The international protection (1951 Geneva Convention, EU rules, Italian rules).
