Interactive lessons are based on consultation and discussion of a wide variety of original legal texts in English from both national and international legal orders, with particular emphasis on sources of law (legislation, case law, treaties); a systematic approach to learning legal terminology and appropriate legal expression is an integral part of the learning process. The following topics are covered: (I) Sources of English law and the British constitution, the impact of European Union and European Convention on Human Rights law; (II) Common law method and the language of civil law and proceedings, with indepth terminology focus on the law of torts; (III) Human rights protection in the common law and the European Convention on Human Rights, with case studies in freedom of religion and freedom of expression; (IV) European Union law and language with special reference to proceedings before the Court of Justice. Specialised terminology work in other branches of law may be inserted on request.
