<b>Course program</b>			
Features of the International Community and of International Law. States and non-States entities.			
The sources of public international law: international custom, <i>ius cogens</i> , international treaties, general principles of international law recognized by civilized nations, other sources. The relationship and interaction between national legal systems and international law.			
The law of the sea. Sovereignty and its limits. Immunities of States and State officials. Dispute settlement and dispute settlement procedures. The international tribunals. The protection of foreign citizens and migrants. The international protection of human rights. The international responsibility for international wrongful acts. The use of force. The UN collective security system.			
<b>Teaching methods:</b> Lessons and seminars. Concrete situations will be addressed and students will be expected to discuss and argue the legally relevant aspects.			

**Auxiliary teaching:** International law sources, international tribunals and courts judgments, and international organizations acts will be analyzed in depth and discussed to make students familiar with international law sources and to develop critical thinking.
