Evaluation criteria	The assessment will take place through a final oral examination. It will test the achievement, of the expected learning outcomes.
Criteria for assessment and attribution of the final mark	Knowledge and ability to understand will be assessed on the basis of knowledge of the prevailing interpretive lines of Political Philosophy. Applied knowledge and understanding will be ascertained by testing the level of congruity between concepts and historical phenomena. Autonomy of judgment will be tested by assessing the ability achieved by the student to select concepts appropriate to the development of a judgment prevalently shared by the discipline. The ability to learn will be detected by assessing the student's aptitude to identify further fields of research to explore independently
