Assessment	
Assessment methods	The exam will take place in written form with open questions aimed at ascertaining the achievement of the learning objectives set. Optional intermediate tests will be proposed (one in the middle of the course and one at the end) with open questions. In this case, the final evaluation will be composed of the average of the evaluations of the intermediate tests.

Final exam and grading criteria	The method of verifying the expected learning outcomes is represented by the written test, which consists of a minimum of three questions on the teaching program. The mark for each question is expressed out of thirty and the final mark is given by the average mark for each question. Grade is based on: knowledge of the program; accuracy in exposure; ability to critically process the acquired knowledge.
	The criteria followed for the evaluation of the learning outcomes expressed out of thirty are:
	Insufficient: 0-17 Lack, incomplete and inadequate knowledge of the fundamental topics

	Great: 29-30 Excellent knowledge of all the topics contained in the program, excellent indepth analysis, connection between the various topics, as well as criticism and command of the vocabulary by the candidates
	Excellent: 30L Excellent knowledge of all the topics contained in the program, excellent indepth analysis, connection between the different topics, criticism and command of the vocabulary by the candidates
