Expected learning outcomes (according to Dublin Descriptors))	In terms of knowledge and understanding, the course aims at providing 1) an image of ancient and medieval thought that differs from the one still widely held outside specialist studies; 2) the ability to understand and interpret texts belonging to ancient thought and to the different cultures of the Middle Ages (Arab-Islamic, Jewish, Greek-Byzantine and Latin-Christian cultures).
