Expected learning outcomes (according to Dublin Descriptors))	<p>In terms of knowledge and understanding, the course aims at providing 1) an image of ancient and medieval thought that differs from the one still widely held outside specialist studies; 2) the ability to understand and interpret texts belonging to ancient thought and to the different cultures of the Middle Ages (Arab-Islamic, Jewish, Greek-Byzantine and Latin-Christian cultures).</p> <p>As far as autonomy of judgement and applied knowledge and understanding are concerned, the course aims at contributing to the development of a mature critical attitude and autonomous design and planning capacities that can be applied not only in different work contexts, but also in the active exercise of one's rights of citizenship.</p> <p>With regard to communication and learning abilities, the course aims at contributing - through active participation to the lessons' discussions and the constant attention to methodological aspects - to the consolidation of individual learning and communication capacities in the field of ancient and medieval intellectual history.</p>
