Prerequisites/requirements	Knowledge of the essential themes related to the history of the Roman Empire during Late Antiquity and to the post classical archeology.

Contents	The course is aimed at learning the general notions of private law and learning fundamental themes of the subject, in particular those concerning issues that regard the relationship between national law and supranational law. Through these contents the essential

	<p>characteristics of the legal method are illustrated to the student, with reference: 1) to the European Union and globalization, the Constitution, the European private law, the <i>lex mercatoria</i>, the rules of international private law, and the national law of others; 2) from the problems related to the political cultural and legal identity of Europe, to the conceptions of European private law, both in terms of national legal traditions, and in terms of European Union law concerning matters of private law; 3) to the problems of harmonization of the Member state's legal systems, also in relation to the drafting of a "European Civil Code".</p> <p>The teaching is inserted within the Jean Monnet Programme, a project co-funded by the Erasmus program + the European Union</p>
