Further information	The English Language Workshops are taught by native speaker language teachers. Students are divided into three levels (pre-intermediate; intermediate; upper intermediate) in accordance with their knowledge of the language. In the second half of September, before the courses begin, students are required to register. Information on how to register will be published at least two weeks before the courses begin on the "Laboratori" page of the LELIA website and on notices posted on the notice board outside the "Segreteriadidattica" - Room n. 7, 1st floor, palazzo Ateneo). Registration will be closed once the maximum number of students per course has been reached.
	Students attending courses will be required to pass an end-of-course test for which they must register on Esse3; information regarding the date of the test will be provided by the language teachers towards the end of the course. Students in possession of a "non-attending student certificate" will be eligible to sit the exam for non-attending students on dates which will be communicated to the administrative office and indicated on the Esse3 platform. The exam timetable for non-attending students can be consulted on the relevant degree course website and on Esse3. Students must register for the exam using the Esse3 system.
