The lessons will focus in particular on the following topics: Carolingian and Ottonian art, Romanesque in Europe and Italy, Gothic in Europe and Italy, artistic production and the Frederician court, painting between XIII and XIV century in Italy.In the second part we propose an in-depth study of the cycle of months in medieval sculpture and some figures of
