	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Recovery of Roman art in the next ages: cultural and politic motivations <p><u>Applying knowledge and understanding</u> - the student will be expected to apply his/her knowledge and understanding to be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Apply knowledge and capacity to the identification of archaeological evidences and the Roman art history and their historical and cultural context, paying attention to literature and epigraphic sources, using an aware reading of ancient historiography <p><u>Making informed judgements and choices</u> - the student will be expected to make informed judgements and choices about all the studied periods, from the archaic age to the end of the empire age, recognizing the characteristic elements about material and artistic culture in relationship with historical and cultural context. The student will be expected to identify the connection between arts and production about the same age and establish comparisons between different ages.</p> <p><u>Communicating knowledge and understanding</u> - the student will be expected to be able to exploit the reading and understanding capacity about archaeological and artistic research with other sources, such as the literary and epigraphic ones to recreate historical and cultural context in the different Roma ages. They will be expected to be able to use these inter-disciplinary methods to increase themselves during future studies.</p>
