Contents	<p><b>The first part</b> of the course is intended to provide a basic preparation about the history of Italian art from the 9th to the 14th century.</p> <p>The lessons will focus in particular on the following topics: Carolingian and Ottonian art, Romanesque in Europe and Italy, Gothic in Europe and Italy, artistic production and the Frederician court, painting between XIII and XIV century in Italy.</p> <p><b>The second part</b> is intended to provide an in-depth study of art in the thirteenth century in Italy and Europe, between Romanesque and Gothic, East and West. In particular, the church of Saint Francis of Assisi and the cycle dedicated to the life and miracles of the saint will be analyzed.</p>
