In both cases, this will consist of four questions (for 9 CFU programmes) and three questions (for 6 CFU programmes), relating to specific historical events, to overviews of specific periods, to problems and issues of specific periods. Partial exemptions will be provided for students who carry out in-depth work during the course. The results of the written test will be communicated by means of a record on Esse3. Students who so request will be able to access the examination and ask for detailed explanations on its assessment. The exam calendar is published on the Degree Course website and on Esse3. In order to register for the exam, it is mandatory to use the Esse3 system.
