<b>Learning Objectives</b>	The course provides a critical overview of the history of criminological thought and criminal policies. Special emphasis will be placed on the examination of "total institutions" and the analysis of the distinct social dynamics that emerge within structures of containment and control, such as prisons, psychiatric hospitals, refugee camps, and centers for irregular migrants.
<b>Course prerequisites</b>	Students are expected to have a foundational understanding of sociological theory and modern political thought. Additionally, it is highly recommended that they possess knowledge of the fundamental principles of public law.

<b>Teaching strategie</b>	In order to fully achieve the learning outcomes, regular attendance of the lectures is highly recommended. Throughout the course, students will be constantly stimulated to debate and critical discussion.
<b>Expected learning outcomes in terms of</b>	
<b>Knowledge and understanding on:</b>	Students will gain a comprehensive understanding of the principal theoretical perspectives in the sociology of deviance and social control. Additionally, they will be introduced to the significant historical developments of modern criminal justice systems.
<b>Applying knowledge and understanding on:</b>	Students will develop the capacity to apply criminological theories to analyse crime prevention policies. They will acquire the skills to critically evaluate the impact and effectiveness of these policies, with a particular emphasis on safeguarding the human rights of individuals involved.
<b>Soft skills</b>	Students will be actively encouraged to cultivate their critical thinking skills and foster a sense of curiosity throughout the course. Emphasis will be placed on equipping students with the necessary tools to effectively select and manage appropriate sources of information.

Assessment criteria	Grades are attributed on a thirty-point scale. The evaluation is based on the following criteria: knowledge of the topic, precision in the presentation, capacity to critically analyse and apply the acquired knowledge.
