Course in "International Law and Practice"

The course provides students with a survey of selected topics in public international law, private international law, and international organizations. Students will learn about practical applications and developments in both public and private international law and the role of international organizations in the development and enforcement of international law. The course will allow students to understand and appreciate practical and actual applications of international law norms in various contexts, including fundamental issues in transnational civil litigation. Students will also have exposure to comparative views of international law, including differing views on the development and application of international law norms. Students will also master some essential international legal research skills and increase their language proficiency in English.

Language of Instruction: English. Some primary source materials will also

be available in English and Italian.
